


3 Years in Social welfare, Socio-economic & Human Development

At the beginning, Proyas Manobik Unnayan Society started its Micro Finance Programme for promoting socio-economic empowerment of the targeted poor women and excluded community, later Proyas obtained partnership with Palli Karma Sahayak Foundation (PKSF) then expanded its Micro Finance Programme in a wider scale geographically and reaching more people under this service through undertaking suitable loan products and components. In line with this advancement, Proyas also obtained partnership with potential commercial bank to meet the growing needs of the beneficiaries as their loan demands are increasing day by day.










In this progression, Proyas has initiated to undertake diversified interventions for socio-economic development including various components of financial inclusion for excluded, backward and marginalised group of people with the support of PKSF, which are as follows:

JAGORON

Jagoron loan product is for poor and excluded people who have been surviving in the subsistent level of poverty in the rural, urban and semi-urban areas and who have less than 50 decimal cultivating land and the productions or returns are not sufficient to meet their daily needs. Consequently, they can't have any savings to meet any sort of emergency requirements because daily labour is only the source of earning. The scheme has provided alternative income generating opportunity with the micro-finance support up to BDT 50 thousand as per their requirements and capacity. In this year, Proyas has supported to 37,201 people with the financial assistance BDT 1.57 billion. Under this scheme, the members have deposited savings BDT 349.19 million as weekly for increasing future asset. The beneficiaries have repaid their loan amount as per rule within 45 weeks.



I had to struggle with my life for two times meal in a day. My husband was a day labour and his income was not sufficient to fulfill all needs of the family. In this painful condition, I become a member and received a loan amount of BDT 30 thousand under Jagoron component from unit-25 Keshorhat of Proyas Manobik Unnayan Society in 2022. I have started handicraft work and sold them in the nearest market by my husband. In this way I hade paid the loan amount as installment. In 2023, in the 2nd step I received BDT 50 thousand and increase the production volume. From this business now, I am paying for the purpose of my son's education and improving my livelihood condition Gradually. I am very happy as contributor in the family with my husband, I would like to thank Proyas and PKSF for their great assistance in helping me to succed.



Agrosor is an advanced level loan product of Proyas Micro Finance Programme for the progression of entrepreneurship. The competent entrepreneurs who have minimum three years' experience and the enterprises are environment friendly, locally appropriate, free from child labour and create employment opportunity for rural and semi urban people is eligible for this scheme. This component has been continuing since 2006 as 'Small Entrepreneur Loan Scheme' and supported to the potential entrepreneurs, who have received another micro-credit assistance earlier but are unable to expand their entrepreneurship due to smaller size of investment. This larger financial service can assist to meet their requirements. The loan celling under this component is BDT 50 thousand to 1 million and the payment system is weekly or monthly by 45 or 12 installments and the duration of the loan is 1 year. Under this scheme a total of 9703 entrepreneurs received financial assistance BDT 1.14 billion and benefitted through intensifying their micro enterprises. The beneficiaries also deposited savings BDT 211.06 million in this year for their future enhancement.



A Shining Example of Winning the Battle of Life.

Sompa

(32 years old)

Jhujkai Bathan Miahpur, Paba Rajshahi.

My husband is a daily wage earner, it has become very difficult to take care of the family due to his income. Earlier I have received a training course on tailoring. In such a situation, I become a member of Bhaiggobanpur Mohila Samiti-155 in this year. I have started a mini garment by taking of BDT 1 lac 20 thousand as Agrosor RAISE loan from unit 20 of Proyas. Currently my husband sells my production in local markets of Rajshahi besides his work and I am earning BDT 25 thousand per month. Along with my husband, my income is helping to run the family. Now, I am free from hesitation. I am happy with my family. My only one daughter has been reading in class seven. Other members come to me to hear the successful story of my positive change and were inspired. I would like to thank Prayas for helping me.

Agrosor Micro Enterprise Development Project (MDP)

Agrosor MDP is another loan product of Proyas for the economic development of micro entrepreneurs in rural, semi urban and urban areas. This product has been continuing since November 2019 with the support of PKSF. This larger financial assistance contributed to meet the requirements of the entrepreneurs to accomplish wider scale of micro enterprises ranging from BDT 50 thousand to 1 million as a result, beneficiaries have able to embellish their enterprise accordingly. Diversified, environment friendly and perceptible entrepreneurs were eligible under this scheme which promoted employment opportunity. A total of 538 entrepreneurs were received financial assistance BDT 27.98 million and benefitted from the scheme in this year.





Way of Self Reliance

Sabia, 35 Years Old Rehaichar, Chapainawabganj Sadar

I am a poor housewife. My husband Yousuf Ali worked as a day laborer of others land. I was unable to arrange 3 times meal in a day properly. In this situation, I become a member Apple Samiti and I have received three times loan from Unit 6 of Proyas. In 2023, I have received BDT 2 lac as Agrosor MDP loan. With this money, I started poultry rearing. I lasyas communicated with Proyas Agriculture Unit for treatment and consultancy. In this yea, I have profited BDT 3 lac. My daughter is reading in class six and goes to school regularly. Now leading a happy life. I have a dream to develop myself as a successful entrepreneur.

Agrosor Micro Enterprise Development Project-Alternative Fund (MDP-AF)

Agrosor MDP-AF is an alternative loan product of Proyas for the economic advancement of micro entrepreneurs in rural, semi urban and urban areas. This loan product started in 2021 with the support of PKSF. This larger financial assistance can meet the requirements of enterprises ranging from BDT 50 thousand to 2 million that helped beneficiaries to expand their business superbly. Multi diversified, friendly environment and visible entrepreneurs were eligible under this product which assisted to create employment opportunity. A total of 729 entrepreneurs received financial assistance BDT 95.37 million and they have benefitted from the scheme through expanding their enterprises.

Cow Rearing Gift a Golden Life

Kamela Begum, Hatramchandropur, Chapainawabganj Sadar

My husband is a day labourer. Due to lack of money, we are unable to fulfill the family requirements. In this condition, I become a member of Hatramchandropur mohila samiti-00 and received BDT 1 lac 30 thousand as Agrosor MDP-AF loan from unit 10 of Proyas in this year. I have started a journey of a new life through cow rearing at home. Each day, I earned BDT 8 hundred by selling milk and repaid the loan amount as installments. Now I am contributing to the family with my husband's income. Today my family is very happy. My one daughter and one son

have been reading in class six and eight. I have two cows and I am planning to increase more cows in the future. I am always maintaining communication with Proyas Agriculture unit for getting necessary technical and treatment support.



Agrosor Sustainable Enterprise Project (SEP)

AGROSOR Sustainable Enterprise Project (SEP) is also a loan product of Proyas for economic progression of targeted micro entrepreneurs. This scheme started in January 2020 with the support of PKSF. This is also larger and faster financial assistance for the expansion of enterprise which is relating to produce safe mangoes in rural, semi urban and urban areas. Trained mango producers and visible enterprises were eligible for this scheme. The celling of the loan under the scheme is from BDT 50 to 1 million. A total of 1336 entrepreneurs were received BDT 150.14 million as financial assistances and benefitted from the scheme. In 2023, the beneficiaries have repaid the loan as per payment policy.


Buniad

This loan product assists to the poorest vulnerable groups and people. The members of female headed households, dependable families, homeless families, irregular laborers, who lives in the slum, roadside or embankment and monthly income approximately BDT 6450 (\$ 2.15/daily, source World Bank) and received assistance from the safety net Programme of government or non-governmental agencies and women working as maids ware eligible under this scheme. The product helped to build economic foundation of the targeted beneficiaries. Proyas mobilised them to become of the mainstreamed society through promoting their livelihoods. In this views Proyas provided financial assistances up to BDT 30

thousand as loan which refunded by 45 installments. Under this scheme 9,340 beneficiaries received financial assistance amounting BDT 39.45 million in this year. They also have deposited savings BDT 93.11 million as weekly for their future wealth.



Small Venture But Bright Prospects



My husband is only the earning member who is a rickshaw puller. We were passing very crucial time because of limited income source, my husband was unable to lead the 4 members of family with very low income. In this situation, I become a member in the Taktaka Mohila Samiti-58 under Unit 22 then received BDT 15 thousand as buniad loan in 2023. With this money, I started Peking duck rearing in a cage. In this year I have earned BDT 40 thousand after fulfill the expenditure and repaid the loan amount as installment. Now I am very happy. We are leading a happy life. My elder son is reading in class nine and younger daughter is reading in class three. I have a dream to establish a big duck rearing farm.

SEASONAL SHORT TERM FINANCIAL SERVICE

Sufalan



Sufalan is a seasonal financial support for promoting agricultural production like crops, mangoes, vegetables, fruits, milk, meat etc. It is such a scheme which supplements another existing components. It has been continuing since 2008 with the support of PKSF. The celling of this loan product is BDT ranging 10 50 thousand. In this thousand to progression, a total of 642 beneficiaries received BDT 51.33 million as Sufalan Ioan for a period of maximum six months. The beneficiaries have repaid their loan as per

Kuwait Goodwill Fund for Food Security KGF Sufalan



KGF Sufalan is also another seasonal short-term agro production based financial support scheme. The beneficiaries who engaged to produce crops, mangoes, vegetables, fruits, milk, meat or operate seasonal income generating activities are eligible under the loan product. The celling of this loan product is BDT ranging 10 thousand to 50 thousand. In this advancement, in 2022 a total of 985 beneficiaries received BDT 30.49 million KGF Sufalan loan for a period of maximum six months. The beneficiaries have benefitted from the scheme and repaid their loan amount as per loan policy.

PROJECT BASED FINANCIAL SERVICE



Income Generating Activities (IGA)

This loan product assists to the members who are engaged in income generating activities for diversified socio-economic development. The celling of the loan product is BDT 50 thousand to 0.5 million. A total number of 1717 beneficiaries received BDT 99.34 million as loan and the members have deposited savings BDT 28.69 million as weekly for their future benefits. This service is available under Unit 10, 16 and 22.



ENRICH Asset Creation Loan (ACL)

This loan product assists to the poor members to make some furniture and jewelry ornament for their family requirements. In this relation, the scheme provides BDT 1 thousand to 50 thousand to the eligible members. In 2023, a total number of 167 beneficiaries received BDT 4.63 million as loan. This service is available under Unit 10, 16 and 22.



ENRICH Livelihood Improvement Loan (LIL)

This loan product assists to the poor people for sanitation improvement. Under this component offers maximum BDT 10 thousand to the beneficiaries as loan amount. The beneficiaries have repaid the loan by 43 installments. Under this loan product total 23 beneficiaries received BDT 0.29 million as loan. This service is available under Unit 10,16 and 22.



Loan Support for Elderly Peoples for Income Generation (LEPIG)

Steadily, elderly people have been isolated from their relatives. The LEPIG loan product is assisting to the elderly people to improve their livelihoods for reintegrating in the society with the support of PKSF. Interested poor women and men who are physically and mentally sound and over the age of sixty are eligible under this component. The loan celling of the scheme is BDT 1 thousand to 60 thousand. In 2023, a total number of 119 beneficiaries received BDT 4.58 million and they deposited savings BDT 2.83 million for their future benefits. This service is available under Unit 10, 16 and 22.





LIFT Goat loan product is a project based financial support to improve the wellbeing of the poor and vulnerable people through promoting farm-based goat rearing. As per membership criteria, the scheme offers three types of loan facilities to the eligible members i.e. Buniad, Jagoron & Agrosor. In 2023, a total of 1,150 Beneficiaries received BDT 80.26 million as LIFT Goat loan under this component. They have repaid the loan amount as per loan policy. This service is available under the Unit 1, 6, 11 and 12.



Typically, the poor people of char area are secluded from contemporary development and neglected by different service providers. In this situation, LIFT Land Lease loan product is a bit of straw floating in the angry waves of the sea for the vulnerable people. The scheme assists who have no access to the income generating activities. The financial service has been continuing under the Unit 3, 29 and 31 since 2018. Under this scheme three types of loan facilities i.e. Buniad, Jagoron & Agrosor are available as per membership criteria. A total of 2834 households received BDT 115.06 million as LIFT land lease loan and they have repaid the loan as per loan policy.



LIFT Sheep

This is a project-based loan product which assists to promote alternative income generating activities (IGA) for the poor people. This service is available under the Unit 1, 6, 11 and 12 since 2018. Under this scheme three types of loan facilities i.e. Buniad, Jagoron & Agrosor are available as per membership criteria. In this year, a total of 225 households received BDT 3.50 as LIFT Sheep Loan and they have repaid the loan as per loan policy.



This loan scheme assisted to increase economic growth of the targeted micro entrepreneurs. This product provides larger and faster financial assistance for the expansion of enterprises which is engaging with fruits production and market extension, materials supply and fostering nursery in rural, semi urban and urban areas. The celling of the loan under the scheme is BDT 1 lac to 40 lacs with 8% service charge. A total of 9 entrepreneurs were received BDT 9.6 million and they have repaid the loan amount as per policy.



This loan product assisted to the informal sector which was affected by pandemic of Covid-19. The loan celling of this scheme is BDT 10 thousand to 1 million with 18% service charge. A total of 647 entrepreneurs received BDT 117.89 million as loan. Under the scheme, the affected enterprises in the informal sector have restarted their production as earlier and young entrepreneurs from the low-income families have been reintegrated in earning source.

NON FINANCIAL SERVICE

LIVELIHOOD, EDUCATION, HEALTH AND HYGIENE

Enhancing Resources & Increasing Capacities of Poor households (ENRICH) Programme

ENRICH Programme is a holistic approach for improving the lives of the poor and



vulnerable people. This intervention has been implementing with the co financial support of PKSF and contribution by Proyas microfinance Programme since 2010. Marginalized, excluded and vulnerable people are eligible as targeted beneficiaries under the Programme. This project is a package of service of three componen

ts, i.e. (a) income generation through micro-credit supports for IGA. asset livelihood creation and improvements imparting IGA training, skill development agricultural training and development. (b) social mobilisation for empowerment of the youths social change agent,



awareness on various social issues that protects children from early marriage, dowry and thus ensure child rights. It also includes environment conservation through the youth clubs and (c) primary health care service etc. About 14090 disadvantaged people at Ranihati and Golaperhat union in Sadar Upazila and at Nizampur Union of Nachol Upazila in Chapainawabganj district have been befitted from the project.

At the early stage of primary education, most of the drop-out appeared lack of inadequate supports and guidance from the family. In the ENRICH Programme area, 70 learning centers for the children from nursery to class two have been maintained at 2 Unions in Nachol and Chapainawabganj Sadar Upazila. These centers are being functioned from 3 pm to 5 pm in all working days. Teachers have assisted them for completing their daily home works, arranged extra lessons and briefing on general knowledge, social norms & decorum. Following table depicts the performance of education support services in 2023.

Primary Health Care Service

In the working area, most of the poor people have no access to improved health services. As poor health conditions, they have to spend a big amount of their income for treatment purpose, which is a challenge to lead their lives. In this context, Proyas has been providing primary health care services at the door-steps for 14090 households at Ranihati Union in Chapainawabganj Sadar and Nizampur Union in Nachol Upazila through ENRICH Programme. Concerned health officers and the health visitors have been providing this PHC services through static and satellite clinics and also refer to Upazila and district level hospitals for secondary and tertiary treatment. The services are included health education, Reproductive health, Ante-natal Care/Post-Natal Care (ANC/PNC), family planning, treating anemia, conjunctivitis, Urinary Tract Infection (UTI) and early detection of pneumonia, diabetic detection, heart disease and neuro medicine. The community level health awareness raising Programmes are included exclusive breast-feeding (including colostrum feeding), adolescent health care, reproductive health care, child nutrition and menstrual hygiene.



Elderly People Development Programme

Commonly, elderly people are isolated from their relatives, that's why they are feeling loneliness. In this condition, this project is assisting to the elderly people for reintegrating in the society with the support of PKSF. In this mission Proyas has distributed 28 pieces of wheel chairs till now (4pieces in this year), Best child and fathers award to 50 persons (20 persons in this year), Veterans honourary one-time financial assistance and crest award to 20 persons and Cremation of the dead for 67 persons (5 persons in this year), furthermore project distributed 60 commode chairs, 524 blankets, 60 umbrellas, 230 scarfs and 120 sticks since inception.





Youth Development Programme

Youth people are the resource to pave way of the development vigorously in the country. However, there is still a need to develop the young people as human resource. In this imagination, Proyas assisted to form 18 youth committee consisting of 396 youths. To enhance the capacity of those youths, Proyas has organised 4 batches of training on Digital Litaracy, Entrepreneurship and Leadership skill development where 100 youths were participated. After the training, 15 youths are operating micro-enterprises as earning sources.

BD RURAL WASH

Poor sanitation and hygiene practices create health hazard of rural community and they have to face some challenges causes of waterborne and vector borne diseases. To promote good sanitation and hygiene practices engaging rural community, Proyas has been implementing BD WASH project with the support of PKSF since December 2023. Project has assisted to construct 800 sets of hygienic latrines (2 pits, 10 rings and 1 slab for each set) In addition, 200 tubewells have been installed by the program in the working area. All the 250 household members have been oriented on hygiene behavior change and maintenance of latrine and tubewell. All the members of those families including children are using the latrines hygienically and practicing hand-washing in right way after defecation and before having food.

Rural Micro Enterprises Transformation Project (RMTP)

Soybean oil is commonly used in cooking purpose. But some times found chemical in soybean oil which is not healthy. Excess oil in foods creates cholesterol in the blood. As this consequence, high blood pressure is a common problem among the people. In this situation, the demand of mustered edible oil has been increasing. A small amount of mustard oil is also produced using conventional machinery which is not able to maintain nutrition quality of the mustard oil at temperatures above 60 degrees. Celsius. In this relation, Proyas has been implementing Rural Microenterprises Transformation Project (RMTP) at Chapanawabganj Sador of this district with the support of PKSF for Enhancing Income of Entrepreneurs through Production and Marketing of Mustard Safe Edible Oil through Increasing the income of small and marginalised farming families and small entrepreneurs since 2022.

Under the project 3 youth entrepreneurs have installed cold oil press machine for mustard oil processing with the project support. In this year 3 cold pressure machines have been established and 100 acres of land are used for mustered cultivation engaging 500 farmers. Project has distributed 4500 kg vermicompost, 300 kg seeds, 50 bottles biopesticide, 300 packets (250g) fungicide and others materials among them farmers. This project assisted for eexpansion of cultivation and production of high yielding varieties of mustard at the farmer level, increase cropping intensity in the project area by using unused land, Produce and marketing of safe mustard oil by using Cold Oil Press Technology and obtaining quality certification from BSTI and creating product branding.









Recovery and Advancement of Informal Sector Employment (RAISE)








In Bangladesh, 86.2% of the total investment is in the informal sector and 78% is associated with cottage and small-scale enterprises (Source; Labour Force Survey 2016-2017), which has been playing an important role to promote economic growth of the country. But the outbreak of covid-19, the informal sector is affected dversely like other sectors. As a result, downturn economy negatively impacted to the livelihood of those entrepreneurs. To reset those enterprises through enhancing capacity for promoting productivity in urban and sub-urban areas, Proyas has been implementing the "Recovery and Advancement of Informal Sector Employment (RAISE)" project with the assistance of PKSF and World Bank since September 2022. The affected enterprises in the informal sector lived back their production as earlier and young entrepreneurs from the low-income families have gotten sustainable employment opportunity.

The project has been implementing in 3 districts i.e. Chapainawabganj, Rajshahi & Natore including 8 sub districts i.e. Chapainawabganj Sadar, Shibganj, Nachole, Gomostapur, Rajshahi Sadar, Mohonpur, Puthia and Natore Sadar. For ensuring smooth operation, 15 Units are engaged with the intervention. Under the project 941 small entrepreneurs, 30 Master craft men (MCP) and 60 youth from low-income groups have benefitted in apprenticeship method through the programme.



Unfulfilled Dreams Come True by RAISE Project

Md. Sirajul Islam 24 Years Old Chapainawabganj Sadar





I could not complete my education after class 5 Due to poverty, in this situation in 2020 I had learned motorcycle servicing from Ustad Anwar Hossain when I was 13 years old. During provisional period, Anwar Hossain provide me only travel allowance which was not contributed in my family. In such circumstance, after 8 months I left the learning of motorcycle servicing and started Masonry work. Suddenly, Ustad Anwar Hossain offered me to learn motorcycle servicing under RAISE project. I agreed and started learning session again. Master paid me BDT 100-150 per day. Thus in 6 months, I learned all the work including engine down. My dream was to have a servicing workshop as Ustad. In the meantime, I got news that an old workshop will sell with the tools and machineries besides the food office Chapainawabganj sador. Some money was already deposited with me; I communicated with the owner and fixed up the price of them with the assistance of Master Anwar Hossain and advanced some money. I have started 'Sirajul Motorcycle Workshop' on November 2023. Now I am earning BDT 15-16 thousand every month and excluding my expenses, I pay BDT 5 thousand to NGO installments. Now the problems of my family are reduced, I am very happy with my family. I would like to thanks to RAISE Project and Proyas Manobik Unnayan Society for assisting me turn my life around.

AGRICULTURE FISHERIES & LIVESTOCK DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME

Kuwait Goodwill Fund for Food Security

This project assisted to promote food security for the poor and vulnerable people through establishing climate resilient and environment-friendly agricultural practice. At the initial stage, the intervention was covered Chapainawabganj Sadar and Gomostapur Upazilas with the financial support of Kuwait Goodwill Fund through Bangladesh Government and PKSF since 2012 but now the technical support of PKSF has been closed except loan product support only. As per field requirements Proyas has expanded the intervention in six Upazilas i.e. Shibganj, Bholahat and Nachol upazila in Chapainawabganj district and Godagari upazila in Rajshahi district with the collaboration of Proyas Agriculture Unit.

In this year a total of 285 farmers have received agriculture technology training and 295 individuals have received livestock and fisheries training in 15 batches which contributes to generate their employment opportunities. Proyas has organized 7 block demonstration events and 12 technology/method demonstration events including vermicompost, goat rearing on platform and fixed fish cultivation to replicate modern technology and good practices.



Gourmoti and Malta Mixed Orchard

Commonly, Chapainawabganj is a mango growing district. Presently, varieties mangoes have been producing in this district round the year. In this advancement, Proyas has initiated to establish mixed orchard for a new variety mango 'Gourmoti' with Malta. An agricultural expert team provided necessary support for executing project entervention with maintaining its demonstration plots through engaging



of community people, entrepreneurs and mango growers at different Upazilas in Chapainawabganj district. Proyas has established 2 acres of demonstration plots engaging 3 farmers who have been cultivated 600 mango trees and 270 Malta trees. However, 19 farmers have established 43 acres of demonstration plots including 3510 mango trees and 6230 Malta trees as replication under the project.

Integrated Agriculture Project



Around half of all workforce in Bangladesh and two-thirds in rural areas are directly employed in agriculture sector. This sector created on-farm and non-farm jobs for women and youths. At the same time, livestock and fisheries sector also has increased land constrained economic growth. But the long-term threat of climate change impacted

the agricultural sector by flooding, saline intrusion, drought and hailstorm. To promote livelihoods of poor farmers, Proyas has been implementing the integrated agriculture project since 2013 with the financial and technical assistance of PKSF.

Introducing High Yielding Variety and Climate Resilient Crop Cultivation

To promote high-value production, Proyas has demonstrated of various high yielding variety of rice, like BRRI-62, BRRI-50 and BRRI-58, as well as demonstrated and expanded the cultivation of high breed maze, onion, and fruits. It has also promoted the cultivation of BARI-wheat-28, BARI-Malta-1, BARI Mustard-14,

BARI lentil-6 in the project area. Proyas has assisted in 91 demonstration plots engaging selected farmers and beneficiaries, as well as a safe vegetables sales corner has been stablished under the project. Besides this, the project enhanced the capacity of targeted beneficiaries on processed food production. This project has been implementing in 7

Fisheries Unit

This project has been implementing in 6 Units of Proyas under three Upazilas of Chapainawabganj district through providing materials and technical assistance. Proyas has assisted to establish fish farms at clusters level for increasing fish cultivation in the available ponds, cannels and river in the project area. The technical persons (Fishery experts) have assisted for building capacity of entrepreneurs, farmers and fishermen. In this

year, 9250 families have been benefitted by cultivating multi-variety of fishes who had 8 to 30 decimals of ponds. Besides this, an assistance package includes Minnows (Fish Fries), net, organic and inorganic fertilizer, lime, and bamboos for vegetable gardens around the ponds were provided among the targeted beneficiaries. The following table demonstrates the achievements of the intervention.

I am a poor fisherman. My family consists of one daughter and two son and my wife. My asset is only a 90 decimal of pond. As a simple fisherman, it was difficult to run the family of 5 members depending on my income. My wife is a member of Nadirabad Samiti under unit 7 of Proyas. As consultation of my wife, I received a training on fish cultivation from Fisheries Unit of Proyas in this year. My wife received BDT 1 lac 20 thousand as agrosor loan from Unit 7 of Proyas and I have started carp fattening in my pond. With the cooperation of the fisheries officers of Proyas, I have continued hard labour for getting appropriate growth of cultivated fish rapidly. I have sold those fish two times in that year and got profit BDT 2 lac 50 thousand after all expenditures and



repaid the loan amount. Now we are happy family. I would like to thanks to Proyas for the assistance to success my dream.

Livestock and Poultry Unit

In Bangladesh, 20 percent of the population is directly and 50 percent is partially dependent on livestock sector (source: BBS). To improve the livelihoods of the rural poor people, Proyas has been implementing this live stock and Poultry rearing intervention since 2013 with the support of PKSF. The purpose of the scheme is promoting successful



entrepreneurs establishing innovative live stock sector through training, technical and financial assistance. In this view, Proyas has provided technical supports to the beneficiaries on goat rearing, cow rearing, beef fattening and producing fodders. Besides these, selected beneficiaries have received training and support for rearing of duck and chicken in this year. Following depict demonstrates the achievements.

Natural Hatchery for Duck Rearing

Most of the farmers think that duck rearing is risky business as it often affected by viral diseases. Because of that people don't show any interest for this type of enterprises, but if the beneficiaries become aware about vaccination, treatment and feed management it could be a potential and economic growing business. In this situation, Proyas has encouraged farmers to establish 39 demonstrations on natural hatchery for enhancing their capacities through technical supports and hatching tray. Presently, 65 natural hatcheries have been functioning and replicating it but other farmers.

Native Chicken Rearing in Caging System

Currently, many varieties of chickens have been rearing for the requirement of rapid growing population of Bangladesh but the demand of native chicken has not decreased at all. In this condition, Proyas has assisted to promote native chicken farming in caging system. In 2023, under the scheme 30 demonstration plots have been established including 340 native



chicken. In the working area, 158 demonstration plots have been functioning with 1575 native chickens as replication method, which inspires the beneficiaries and fulfills the market demand. Proyas provided technical, materials and vaccination support to success the intervention.

Learning and Innovation Fund to Test New Ideas (LIFT)

It's a livelihood development project for the poor and vulnerable people with the support of PKSF. This intervention has been implementing across in 11 unions and a municipal area of Chapainawabganj district since 2014. The scheme assists to develop new tools and technology for improving livelihood of the excluded people in the char areas through creating employment opportunity. A potential team provided required supports to the beneficiaries.

Black Bengal Goat Rearing



The surviving capacity of Black Bengal goats are higher than other breeds of goats in the drought prone area. There are about 26.64 million goats where Black Bengal goat comprises more than 90% of the total goat population of Bangladesh (source: BBS). The female goat gives birth 2-3 babies in every 6 months and twice in a year, which is an additional source of income for the landless and poor farmers. In the project

area, 5232 households established goat rearing farm and they were benefitted by rearing 56032 'Black Bengal' goats under 34 clusters. Proyas has provided all sorts of technical supports including vaccinations, Napier grass cultivation for fodder, imparting training and financial service to the targeted beneficiaries.

Proyas has also established a demonstration farm with 10 acres of land and Proyas has taken 22 acres land as lease for growing grass, where beneficiaries have been getting cutting support for their own fodder production. In that farm, 95 Black Bengal goats have been rearing in that farm. Furthermore, fruits-trees like mango, guava and jackfruit are maintaining efficiently.

Sheep Rearing



It's easy maintainable enterprise by the engagement of women besides their-housework. In Bangladesh there areabout 3.67 million sheep (source: BBS). Its meat is very much delicious. Gradually, it is becoming popular in the local markets. The Ewe gives birth 2-3 lambs in every 6 months and twice in a year, which is an additional source of income for the landless and poor families. The scheme has been continuing at 5 unions

of Shibganj, Gomostapur and Chapainawabganj Sadar Upazilas in Chapainawabganj district since 2018. In this year, a total of 330 households were benefitted by rearing 13000 sheep. For proper management of those sheep, selected beneficiaries received technical, financial and treatment service from the LIFT project.

Md Sukchand Miah 37 Years Old Char Pnaka, Shibgaqnj, Chapainawabganj

We learned from the life, "Hard work is the mother of good luck". The point is, success never comes on its own. A road map to success is needed. If we want to reach the peak of progress in human life, determination and hard work are absolutely necessary. So today, I will share to you about my hardworking and success story. Shirina Begum is my wife and I have two sons and a daughter. We are living in river erosion area. Hundreds of



hectares of arable land been washed have away by the Padma River, in some places it is not possible to grow crop except any seasonal paddy. I was not able to fulfil my family needs. In this have condition, received a training on sheep rearing and farm

management from LIFT project. My wife Shirina is a member of Samiti of Proyas, she received BDT 1 lac as LIFT Sheep loan. I have started rearing sheep with the technical assistance of Proyas LIFT project. I received also day warming and vaccination support for my sheep from the project. In this year, at the initial stage I had 35 sheep and now I have 125 sheep which approximate value is BDT 6 lac 25 thousand. I sold 20 sheep and earned BDT1 lac 80 thousand. I have a dream to build a big farm for creating employment opportunity for the char people. Specially, I would like to thanks to Proyas for their effective support.

Land Lease Programme

Usually, the development sectors are interested to work in the main land. In the isolated areas (especially Char areas) as remote communication, poor and vulnerable people have limited access to alternative income generating activities. To improve the livelihoods of poor people through promoting agriculture and livestock production, Proyas extended its financial and technical assistance by land leasing scheme. Under the intervention, a total of 2972 households benefitted by cultivating verities of crops, vegetables and fruits in 2023.

Native Chicken Rearing in Caging System

It's a potential sector for promoting socio-economic status of the poor farmers. It is also a good item as supplementary nutrition. In the country, there are verities of seasonal crops, flowers and fruits garden. In Chapainawabganj mustard and black



cumin seeds are cultivated in every year. In this way, there is a scope to cultivate honey from these flowers with a modern way. It's also help to increase crops production by flower pollination.

Proyas has initiated to implement the Apiculture Programme (PAP) through Capacity building and

equipping bee farmers in the related field like production, processing, preservation and market promotion since 2007. In 2023, this project has produced 360 kg honey and 9 kg wax. Under the project, awareness raising programme also were undertaken on appropriate uses of honey, its nutrition and quality through radio programme and leaflet distribution.

CLIMATE CHANGE AND ENVIRONMENT

Climate Change And Environment

Climate change is a global issue, presently climate resilient and environment friendly economic progress is important for the sustainable development. The rapid growth of industrial manufacturing has led to emission of green house gases which is the factor of climate change. If the trend is continued for a long time, our environment will become uninhabitable for the next generation. In this view, Proyas has undertaken some mitigation and adaptation measures through agro based initiatives to promote environment friendly technologies and good practices among microenterprises to encourage changes of ecosystem and support the adoption of basic operational safety norms

Promoting Agricultural Commercialization and Enterprises (PACE)



Mango is seasonal fruit of summer and usually the season starts on June and remains until earlier August. Presently, high yielding verities mangoes have been producing in this district round the year. But there is no any diversified mango based production technology and products. As a result, farmers or producers don't get market value properly. In this view, Proyas has initiated a project in order to preserve ripe mango

without chemical by heat drying process with the financial support of PKSF. Besides this, the project has assisted to produce other seasonal dry fruits, vegetables and foods applying same process in healthy and hygienically and delivered it at the local markets. The beneficiaries are getting appropriate product value by creating employment opportunity.

To increase income and create employment entrepreneurs for through opportunity expansion of summer onion cultivation, Proyas Manobik Unnayan Society has implemented this value chain sub-project in Chapain Nawabganj (Unit-1, 7, 11, 12 & 29), Rajshahi (Unit-23) and Natore districts (Unit-46) with the support of PKSF. A total of 525 farmers and beneficiaries (400 men and 125 women) received training on summer onion and onion seed production. Project also assisted to stablish 1 demonstration plot, distributed 400 kg onion seeds arranged 2 field day 2 exchange visits and 2 market linkage workshops. As a result, others farmers have been practicing advanced technology as replication trough exhibition event.

Sustainable Enterprise Project (SEP)



Chapainawabganj mango producing district in Bangladesh. In this district, on average 2 lakh 30 metric tons of mangoes has been producing each year and the livelihood of 50 thousand people have been ensured from this sector. This project assists to promote environment friendly technology Good Agricultural Practice (GAP) for producing safe mango. In this mission, Proyas has been implementing the

Sustainable Enterprise Project (SEP) in Chapainawabganj district with the technical support of PKSF and financed by World Bank since June 2020. The project has enriched 4000 beneficiaries through 150 batches of training on Safe Mango Production, Mango business in safe way, safe mango production certification and environmental certification, establishing 175 ecological farming plots through

distributing 100,000 fruit plants, 4500 175 bags, bottles Bio pesticides 175 bottles fungicides Ecomack Biosheild and 32,500 kg Trico-compost fertilizer. Project also assisted to establish 5 safe mango and exported markets around 570 tons mango in the international markets.

55 Years Old Shibganj, Chapainawabganj

I have a mango garden where has 20 mango trees, but I was not able to produce safe mangoes lack of proper maintenance. Even I would not be profitable from there. In this moment, I am understood about Sustainable Enterprise Project of Proyas which was implementing with the support of PKSF. I have talked with the project personnel and I have received training from Proyas on how to produce safe mangoes. Then, I become a member in Shibganj Purush Samiti. I received BDT 2 lac as Agrosor SEP loan. By the consultation of the SEP project, I have started maintenance of the garden in safe way with practicing Good Agricultural Practic (GAP) carefully. In 2023, I have produced 12000 kg safe mangos and I have profited BDT 5 lac 20 thousand after fulfill the all expenditures and repaid the loan amount. I am proud of getting assistance from Proyas and I would like to thanks to PKSF and Proyas for their technical and financial services.



Proyas Nursery

Trees help to balance the echo system and agro based economic development by producing fruits. In this mission, Proyas has been implementing 'Two-Tire Management of New-Variety of Mango (Gourmoti) and Malta Production and Post-Production Preservation Management' project. Under this project, Proyas developed a nursery engaging trained farmers including 97 types of trees in the nursery i.e. BARRI-11, banana mango, BARRI-4, BARRI Malta, china orange,

coaxing, kamranga, BARRI coaxing-1, red leady, papaya, peya thai-5. thai-3, BARRI-90, barai Kashmiri, sundory, apple kul, babu kul, faschor, ball sundory, coconut, dragon, china orange-3, op green, op golden, op raj, op Vietnam. There are a total of 13,260 thousand trees in the nursery.



Proyas Vermi-compost Promotion

This project encourages to the rural farmers to promote organic agricultural practices. As integral part of the project, Proyas has established a vermicompost plant. Furthermore, Project has trained up to 1450 producers and provided support them to establish demonstration plants. All those demonstration plants have been functioning now and the trained farmers produced 29,500 kg vermicompost. This initiative helped to increase organic agricultural production and practices.

PEACE AND JUSTICE

USAID'S Fight Slavery and Trafficking-in-Persons (FSTIP) Activity

Human trafficking is rightly referred to as the "modern slavery". Organized criminals target and entrap men, women and children to extract profit through human trafficking. Due to trafficking, people endure different forms of exploitations including sexual exploitation, early/force marriage, forced labour, force prostitution, debt bondage and organ sale. To improve this situation and contribute to prevent of human trafficking, Proyas has been implementing the USAID's Fight Slavery and Trafficking-in-Persons (FSTIP) project with the technical support of Winrock International and financial support by United State Agency for International Development (USAID) since April 2022. This project is actually the continuation phase of Bangladesh Counter Trafficking in Person (BCTIP) project which had been started in 2009 with the support of the same donor. Under this project, Proyas extended its support in 3 districts i.e. Chapainawabganj, Rajshahi and Naogaon. Proyas has tried to create awareness among a total of near about 1 million people through cultural program/Gomvira songs and message dissemination programs by radio and 10 thousand project participants by active engagement in various events such as courtyard meeting, school sessions, Beyond this, Proyas activated a total of 36 unions, upazila and district Counter Trafficking Committees (CTC) and provided orientation to the committee members to enhance their capacity.









Preventing Extremism through Active Community Engagement (PEACE) Project

Proyas has been implementing PEACE project with the financial support of Global Community Engagement and Resilience Fund (GCERF) and technical support from RUPANTAR since 2016. Proyas intends to build a resilient community to promote peace, solidarity and social harmony with mutual respect to each other engaging 483 youths by forming 23 Peace Clubs at 22 unions and 1 Peaurashava of Gomostapur and Chapainawabganj Sadar Upazila in Chapainawabganj district. The total of 23 peace clubs divided into 3 clusters are being served properly. The focusing activities are quarterly youth platform meeting, joint social youth action, capacity building of youth, Upazila and district level advocacy meeting etc. Main purpose of the phase is institutionally sustainability of those Peace Clubs.









CORPORATE SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY

Scholarship to Meritorious Students

In 2023, Proyas has provided BDT 4 lac 80 thousand to 40 meritorious and vulnerable students (each student BDT 12 thousand) for the advancement of their education with the financial support of PKSF. Since 2018, a total of 262 students received total amount of BDT 27 lac which stimulated them to complete the education life.

Radio Mahananda FM 98.8 (Community Radio of Proyas)



Bangladesh Government allowed 19 Community Radio Stations. In this continuation, Mahananda FM 98.8 was established Chapainawabgani district in 2010. It is covering 25 nautical kilometers across 9 Upazilas of the district, 2 Upazilas of Rajshahi district and 2 Upazila of Naogaon Upazilas district and 5 Chapainawabganj district. Radio Mahananda assisted to develop diversified Programme addressing

the issues related to life and livelihood of the people i.e. entertainment Programme, community development news, local government issues, women empowerment, DRR & Climate Change, agriculture, Right to Information & unsafe migration, health & education and also the issues related to technology driven development. It functioned from 3 pm to 1 am (10 hours on air) and in online 24 hours every day. This radio is also very popular as it is transmitting local news and also cultural events using local dialect (like Gambhira, Alkap). There are 320 proactive listeners clubs including a total of 8 lac audience. The tune of the Radio Mahananda is "The words of life the sounds of life", actually the tune is the voice of local people.

Proyas Folk Theatre Institute (PFTI)



Proyas Folk Theatre Institute (PFTI) has been working for researching and developing of traditional folk cultures, preservation of cultural heritage and utilizes those for social development since 2007. Cultural event helps to the people to think critically and judge the reality and what initiatives are required for the further improvement. In this view, PFTI is playing a vital role to increase the adequacy of folk culture through

updating all forms of folk culture. As a part of the regular Programme, PFTI has been organised various types of cultural event on the social development issues in Bangladesh i.e. Right to Information, Protect Women Rights, Promote Human Rights, Prevent Extremism, Improve Health Hygiene and Climate Change. In addition, PFTI presently work on video content development and maintaining a You Tube channel for publication.



Proyas Hospital

Proyas Hospital is located in Chapainawabganj city and commonly it provides basic and secondary health care services to the poor and the vulnerable people with minimum costs. Under the Health Insurance Scheme, the beneficiaries have been getting subsidised health care, diagnostic and operative services from this hospital. Moreover, Proyas Hospital provides general health and public health care services through the Satellite Clinics in collaboration with the government medic al doctors and by Static Clinic at unit office of Proyas. In 2023, a total of 7,500 clients received services from 537 Static Clinics and 520 individuals received free treatments from 34 Satellite Clinics. Besides this, a total of 10500 patients received indoor treatment from Proyas Hospital.



Psycho-social Development through Cultural Programme

Traditional culture stimulates to develop psychology and leadership of the youths. This project assisted to revive the traditional game engaging the students, youths, teachers and education sector which helped to protect youths from any unethical work like radicalisation, drug addiction and eve-teasing. Under the Programme Proyas has organised 8 cultural events where a total of 3700 (girls 2080 & boys 1620) students and youths were participated.





Adolescent Programme



This project assisted to establish 104 adolescent clubs (52 Kishori & 52 Kishor) engaging 2600 adolescent (1300 girls & 1300 boys) and who are volunteerism providing service for changing social behaviors. They are good playing role to capacity enhance the among the adolescents on general health & nutrition,

reproductive health and personal hygiene, as well as they are raising awareness on preventing early marriage, dowry, sexual abuse and eve-teasing. Furthermore, project has provided different types of sports materials and books for their improvement.

Living Deltas Research Hub

In particularly, our youth are rarely seen to be active in entrepreneurial (self-employment) work, which is recognised as one of the approaches to employment. This is a neglected opportunity for local as well as national development. The entrepreneurial youth Initiative is a timely attempt to make the most of this neglected opportunity at the local and national level. As part of this, Proyas has been implementing the 'Living Deltas Research Hub' project since 2021 with the attachment of 30 families at Nachol upazila of Chapainawabganj district by the support of Lancaster University from UK. The purpose of the study is to explore how these changes can be made more sustainable. Centre for Participatory Research and Development CPRD and BRAC University have provided technical support with the consultation of Lancaster University from UK.

Making Bangladesh's Healthcare Systems More Responsive and Participatory



As poor health services, general people are losing their interest and are lagging behind the track of development. To raise the voice of rural community and to revive the health system, Proyas has been implementing the Project named "Making Bangladesh's Healthcare Systems More Responsive and Participatory" with the financial support of Swedish International Development Corporation Agency-SIDA and technical support of Bangladesh Health Watch since

2021. Under the project, Proyas has undertaken 3 training programmes where attended a total of 75 members of those forums. Those Undertaken Trainings were Youth Leadership Development & Community Participation, Gender Sensitivity and Journalism in Health. As a result, these forums have been playing good roles for raising public awareness and sensitise the health sectors for ensuring transparency, accountability and public participation in improving the quality of

healthcare services.
Furthermore, the project has been assisting to a Upazilla Health Complex and 2 Community Clinic at Nachol Upazilla in Chapainawabganj district to create responsive environment for ensuring quality health service.



TRAINIG PROGRAMME

Capacity Building of Staffs







Competent staffs are required for a development organisation to execute the Programmes. In this purpose, a well-equipped training cell has been maintained with an experienced training team. For this continuation, Proyas has been organised various types of training, orientation and workshops for 231 staffs i.e. Microenterprise Strategy Expansion, Financial Analysis, Risk Management & Gender Sensitive Programme Management, Improved Farming Technology, Leadership and Professionalism Development, Monitoring & Supervision. In addition, Proyas has arranged seminar, dialue sessions, advocacy meeting and campaigning Programmes. In this progression, all staffs were conceptualised regarding these issues and played their role professionally.

Beneficiary Training







Organisation is more optimistic with its reflective dream to improve the socio-economic and livelihood status of engaged stakeholders through enhancing their capacity. In this mission, Proyas has organised training on some relevant issues i.e. Fish Cultivation, Goat Rearing, Sheep Rearing, Cow Fattening, Organic Agriculture, Homestead Gardening, On-and-off Farming, Vermi Compost production, Safe Mango Production & Certification, Environmental Certification, Mango Business Certification, Women's Rights, Climate Change Adaptation, Sanitation & Hygiene, Nutrition, Adolescent Development, Bee Farming Method, Youth Leadership development, Peace and Tolerance etc. In this year, a total of 5200 beneficiaries and group members were received trainings. Trained beneficiaries are improving their wellbeing gradually.




